Highlights of 2012

- **Dominican Republic:** Serving more than 1,400 children every day. Completed new classrooms in Caraballo and Jarabacoa and progressed on a new multi-use building at Casa Monte Plata.
- **Guatemala:** launched our Keeping Families Together Program. Completed new Ester House for older girls and a health survey in Zapote to fight malnutrition.
- **Haiti:** Dedicated our new Children's Village and identified property for our future school site with construction to begin in 2013.
- **Kenya:** More than 400 children and young people receiving quality care and education, including more than 30 in university or vocational training.
- **Lebanon:** Our elementary school is at capacity with 80 students and includes some refugees from troubled Syria.
- **Papua New Guinea:** 10 new churches have been planted by graduates of our Bible Training Center. Another 17 students have become spiritual leaders in their villages.
- **Peru:** Started AWANA Clubs at Mission TEC and the Oasis. Finishing construction of the last building at the Oasis and completed a second Children's Home in Pucallpa.
- **Romania:** House of Hope continues to thrive with several girls starting high school. Denisa Care Center serves more children than ever before.
- **South Sudan:** Began building a new Children's Home in Wau to care for 32 former street kids.
- **Sudan:** Secured new location for the Boys' Hope Center in Khartoum serving 30 children.
- **Zambia:** A third Children's Home and a dining room were opened in Mongu and construction began on a new school.

Home-grown teachers reach into remote areas.

In Papua New Guinea, 24 teachers travel up and down the Sepik River, serving more than 600 students in eight elementary schools. Most of these teachers studied as little kids with us. Now they are giving back to the region.

Even when gas prices spike to as much as \$16.50 per gallon, they run their canoes with outboard motors to bring hope and education to children in remote villages. We never close schools — even if the teachers have to paddle to get to their classrooms!

Our nurse, Clinton, also grew up with us and now serves alongside the teachers, ministering to the children with healing and health. He is credited recently with stopping the spread of a cholera outbreak in this area.

Graduates support and encourage one another.

In April, 35 Kids Alive alumni in Kenya gathered for a reunion and training week. This was the first event of its kind and a huge success, mixing training seminars and counseling sessions with fun activities that renewed old ties.

Topics covered included financial management and tithing, making your faith your own outside the Kids Alive home, how to write an effective resume, job-search skills, social media etiquette, and developing healthy relationships. Several alumni testified that this was a life-changing week for them. These energetic young people are studying aeronautical engineering, architecture, teaching, IT, business, 3D animation and web design, construction, electrical installation, agricultural engineering, tourism, hotel management, food production and ministry.

In the Dominican Republic, 34 youth are receiving college scholarships from our Advanced Education Fund. This program allows academically strong Christian youth to continue with higher education, in spite of their extreme poverty. And these young people are giving all they have to achieve remarkable goals.

Jeury teaches computer classes at ANIJA during the day — but at night he studies medicine at a local university. Andy works as our accountant at the Palo Blanco care center while studying university-level engineering on weekends. Rosemary runs a homework study hall for Kids Alive each day while just completing her first semester studies to be a teacher.
